LETTERS FROM THE CO-EDITORS

Hello Everyone,

I hope you all enjoyed our new-look Chronicle. Rachel did a lovely job sorting out all the different articles. First of all I must begin by apologising for failing to record our thanks for two separate amounts of money given to Church funds at the time of the Scarecrow Festival. The ladies of Church Fold made cakes and sold them to our visitors and gave the Church £240.40. The residents of Croston Lane also took part in fundraising, they gave the Church £40.00 and the Community Centre Trust £40.00. We really do appreciate your gifts. When the monies for the Church were banked they were not recorded separately, they were banked with the rest of the fundraising proceeds. I do apologise for this omission.

I welcomed the children from Pre-School into Church last month along with some of their helpers. I was able to show them around all the different areas of our Church building pointing out many of the interesting features. Most of the children had been baptised in our Church so they were quite interested in the font. We rang the bell, when the children are a little older they do get the opportunity to ring the bell on Sunday mornings. They showed a keen interest in the monument in memory of Frances Darlington. I did point out her body was not inside the monument.

On March 1st 2019 members of our Church were invited to the World Day of Prayer, this year it was held at Coppull Parish Church. The service had been prepared and written by women from Slovenia, a country in central Europe, known for its mountains, ski resorts and lakes. It is part of the former Yugoslavia. The heart of the service was an open invitation for all to come to God's table, "Come, everything is ready!". We heard the voices of some of those coming to the table ... wives, mothers, grandmothers, Roma people, refugees, and migrant workers. Their stories reflected the political and economic situation of Slovenia from the time it was a socialist-communist state to the present day. We left the service with a prayer of blessing to mutually support one another on the path of freedom, justice and peace.

On March 2nd 2019 Malcolm, Rachel Simm and I attended the Children's Conference at Barton Grange. The emphasis this year was the importance of Family Ministry. There were three keynote speakers: Rachel Turner is passionate about equipping and supporting Christian parents to coach their children in faith; Bishop Jill is also very passionate about family ministry; Dr. Sam Johnson, Deputy Director of Education, and father of two teenage boys, talked of how we can understand the challenges that face the current generation of under 18's. We also attended two workshops in the afternoon. We always come back with fresh ideas and challenges as we work with children and their parents in our community.

Each week during Lent we are running another part of the Pilgrim Course, on this occasion it is The Eucharist. Father Andrew came to the first session and explained to us why he does certain things at different points in the Eucharist. We all received the bread and the wine. Philip Tranter is leading the rest of the course. Members of the group are able to question and discuss any issues arising.

On Saturday March 16th 2019 we held a Messy Church in the Old School. 29 children and their families plus 3 babies attended the event. The theme on this occasion was Creation. The children were shown how to grow cress, plant bulbs and plant sunflower seeds. At one table the children were able to make Easter cards and at another table they created a chicken coming out of an egg. Rachel encouraged the children to join her in the actions of the Butterfly Song. I told the children about the life cycle of the butterfly. One little boy, Sam, knew all about the butterfly, and was able to help me tell the other children! I would like to thank all our helpers, 13 in total, who prepared the activities for their tables, and provided and served the food.

Yesterday, March 23rd 2019, Malcolm, John Hind and I, along with Father Andrew and one of the churchwardens from Eccleston St. Mary, attended an "Open Consultation on Parish Share" at Accrington St. Christopher's Church of England High School. This meeting was called by the Diocese to discuss with representatives of all parishes the fairest way of assessing how much money each parish is asked to contribute to the Diocesan Board of Finance. The Parish Share Review Group has been working together for 18 months to look at all sorts of options. They have consulted with other Dioceses across the country and examined different formula. Three options were put forward yesterday. Malcolm, John and I felt that the current formula was probably as good as any where certain factors such as Regular Weekly Attendance and the Socio-Economic Multiplier (based on Indices of Multiple Deprivation) were taken into account. The monies we have to pay to the Diocese cover clergy stipend, national insurance contributions, pensions, clergy housing, training clergy and lay readers for the future, and parish share relief which helps parishes which are particularly in need. Our parish has always paid it's parish share, if we did not pay in full other parishes would have to pick up the shortfall. It is all to do with sharing the cost of

ministry throughout the Diocese and some parishes maintain Christian ministry in some very deprived areas, and in areas where Christianity is by no means the main faith.

I hope everyone in Charnock Richard is very grateful for all the blessings we receive. We live in an attractive rural area, have an excellent School and Pre-School, top class sporting facilities, very popular public houses offering quality food, and a very strong and supportive community. Our Church is here for you, for your happy times and your sad times. We can guide and assist you in planning your wedding, and we are here to support you in times of grief. However, maintaining ministry in this parish does have a big cost. Over the last few years our expenditure has exceeded our income, our costs have risen. I would like to thank everyone who already contributes to the cost of running our Church here, but can I please ask you to review your giving? If you are not a regular contributor, can I please ask you to consider becoming a regular contributor? We do have an envelope scheme, but many people now contribute by standing order. If you are a tax payer you can gift-aid your contribution, our Church can then reclaim the tax. If you feel you can help please contact either myself or John Hind, our acting treasurer, or the churchwardens. If you require clarification on any of these issues please do not hesitate to contact me.

I do hope you enjoy reading this Chronicle. If you have any news which you think will interest others, please let me know. I wish you all a very happy Easter.

A MESSAGE FROM FATHER ANDREW

My dear friends,

Gardens are very important to us: we know that well living in a part of the country where many people spend a considerable part of their leisure time tending their gardens and sometimes opening them to the general public so the whole community can enjoy their efforts. Particularly at this time of year we are beginning to emerge from the drabness of winter to colour and beauty all around us. In church we are also reflecting this reorientation from the bare appearance of our building devoid of flower displays for the whole of Lent to what we will enjoy during Eastertide with the abundance of colour and beauty.

However, before that, we reflect on the sufferings and passion of Christ in Holy Week but even there we can see flowers and a garden at the centre of our worship. The Easter Journey is now in its sixth year as English and Drama students from Bishop Rawstorne Church of England Academy break open the story for our Primary School children in Godly Play around the stations in church. If the weather is kind to us this year we will be taking the Easter Journey into the open air of the church yard – something that was forced on us a couple of years ago when we had a power cut and lost our inside lights! The outdoor space is a good place to worship as it is an authentic setting for Jesus' last week when he spent time praying in the Garden of Gethsemane.

Our young people who are preparing for Confirmation this year on Ascension Day, 30 May, will be coming to church to relive Jesus' act of service when he washed the feet of his disciples at the Last Supper. At the end of that act of worship the priest also shows his service to God by stripping the altar and taking all ornaments and decoration from the sanctuary so that the holy place we encounter in church is bare and empty as Good Friday approaches. However, there is one other garden to visit in that in between time of Maundy Thursday and Good Friday: it is our own Gethsemane around the Altar of Repose. This is a beautifully decorated altar surrounded by many flowers and candles as pray with Jesus up to midnight.

There is a little known 20th century hymn which describes three gardens in the bible: Eden, Gethsemane and the garden around Jesus' tomb. The second verse of the hymn touches the point we all hope to reach as we kneel in adoration at the Altar of Repose.


Walking in a garden
Where the Lord had gone,
Three of the disciples,
Peter, James, and John;
They were very weary,
Could not keep awake,
While the Lord was kneeling there,
Praying for their sake

Here in Gethsemane, God's creative energy is the reverse side of the events when creation was marred by humankind's sinful nature causing us to fall away from perfection and a close relationship with God. At the Altar of Repose, we enter into the lonely agony of Christ as he contemplated his own mortal nature, but also his divine nature of being the suffering God on earth. Those of us who go through this period of dark loneliness at the Altar on Maundy Thursday experience unity with God as he faces isolation, betrayal and death. This is a personal journey of self-emptying and yielding to God. We talk about Jesus emptying himself on the cross, pouring out himself for all creation in order that sin can no longer dominate the earth: our Gethsemane can help us on that journey.

However and wherever you encounter a garden this Lent and Easter I hope you will reflect that here is something given to us by God the Father. Hopefully it will be a spiritual encounter to make your Holy Week more poignant, perhaps at school worship during the Easter Journey, around the Altar or Repose on Maundy Thursday or merely in the beauty of creation in the gardens of our local community.

Every blessing for a holy Lent and joyous Easter,

It is an occasion we intend to repeat. The Old School is an excellent facility for such an occasion, plenty of room in the main hall and good kitchen facilities to serve the food. 



DROWNING IN PLASTIC? A MESSAGE FROM SCOUTS



We are your local Scout group, and we've been looking into the problem of throw-away plastics, as part of our research for the "Environmental Conservation" badge.

We've learnt that:

- there are an estimated 8.3 billion tonnes of unused plastic waste in the world – that's more than 1 tonne of waste plastic for every single person on Earth!
- all of the plastic ever made still exists, because it's only been produced since the mid-20th Century, but it will take between 400 and 1000 years to decompose.
- most plastics don't "biodegrade", they just break into smaller and smaller pieces, turning into "microplastics" that can enter our food-chain.
- around 8 million tonnes of plastics are finding their way into our oceans each year; the equivalent of one truckload per minute being tipped into the sea!
- if we continue at our current rate, then by 2050, there will be more plastic than actual sealife in our oceans!

Then we talked about some of the ways we could try to solve the plastic waste problem, and we looked into recycling plastic. We found out that:

- in the North of England alone, 10 million tonnes per year of potentially recyclable plastic gets put into landfill.
- there is still a lot of confusion, locally, about which types of plastic we're allowed to put in our recycling bins.
- the huge increase in the use of plastic is partly down to the rapid growth in single-use plastic packaging.
- Only about 9% of all the plastic ever produced has actually been recycled.

So it seems clear that we can't just recycle our way out of our plastic problem!

As young people, we are very concerned about the future of our planet and we think it is vital that we try to find ways to **REDUCE** the amount of throw-away plastic we use. We also want to ask you to please try to do the same.

We understand that making "environmentally friendly" choices might sometimes be a bit more expensive, in the short-term, but we think it's worth trying to change our habits, for the sake of the planet and our future.

1) Milk Bottles

If you buy your milk in plastic bottles from the supermarket, why not consider having it delivered in glass bottles from a local dairy farmer?

- You might be put off by the thought that it will cost more, but we worked out that the difference is only about 20p more per pint. If you regularly get 5 pints, that's only £1 more a week, or just over £50 a year.
- Over the past 50 years, the cost of a pint of milk has only risen by less than 2% a year, but the cost of a pint of beer in the pub has risen by more than three times that much!
- It could help our community to support a local delivery service in this village, where we have so many elderly people and no shops.
- You can get not only milk delivered to your door, but also cream, butter, eggs, cheese, yoghurt, and even non-dairy substitute milks, like soya.

We talked to a local milkman, Mr I.W. Critchley, and if you get in touch with him, and mention this letter from Charnock Richard Scouts, he is offering a week's free trial!

2) Bars of Soap

If you use liquid soap from a plastic pump dispenser, then please think about swapping to an old-fashioned solid bar of soap. It works just as well, and often comes wrapped in biodegradable paper. It's even better for the environment if you buy it from a local supplier.

Did You Know? We have our own traditional soap factory, the DROYT Soap Company in Chorley, tucked away in a Victorian mill on Progress street. It opened in 1893 in Minsk, Russia, but moved to Chorley in 1938. They specialise in luxury glycerine soaps. You can check out their website at www.droyt.com.

We hope you will try our ideas, and maybe think of some of your own ways to cut down on the amount of plastic you throw away. Please talk to your friends & family, and encourage them to try and ditch the plastic too!



Charnock Panto at its best!

Back in early February this year, Charnock Panto at Christ Church Charnock Richard Primary School, performed their fourth pantomime, Jack and the Beanstalk. The pantomime received rave reviews from it's audiences; which consisted of the local uniformed groups (Beavers, Cubs and Scouts), children and families from school, local business owners, councillors, families of cast and crew and many more from around the village. And yet again, we exceeded all our expectations and raised a record amount of over £6000, all of which has gone directly to school funds to provide resources and equipment to continue enhancing our children's education.



It has been a whirlwind of an adventure for most of those involved in all of our pantomimes, which started way back in 2013 with Cinderella, 2015 with Aladdin, 2017 with Snow White and then this year's show of Jack and the Beanstalk.

The idea of putting on a pantomime in 2013 came following a PTFGA meeting where ideas were needed to raise funds for extra resources for our children. After watching an amateur pantomime only weeks before; we proposed to the group that our school (with the help from other parents and staff at school) could surely put on such an event as well, to raise these much needed funds.

Panto also provided a great opportunity to get staff, parents, ex-pupils, friends and governors together in a team to create a thoroughly entertaining production. The children have looked forward to seeing their parents and teachers make fools of themselves in all the shows.

The behind the scenes organising takes over 18 months, from the start of the process to the finished performances in February. This includes preparing a script (ensuring we include lots of localisms and current events), casting the roles, creating a budget, requesting back stage volunteers, recording the script on CD for the cast to learn lines over the holidays, designing and printing of flyers, posters and tickets, attending the Scarecrow Festival, designing and painting backdrops, stage props and costumes, of which a lot is done before rehearsals begin.



Rehearsals start in September each week in the evenings, programmes are designed, advertisements are canvassed, merchandise is purchased for the front of house, along with sweets, a fully licensed bar and even a full extravagant gala night with hotpot supper, apple pie and waitress service that is laid on for those who prefer a more lavish night of entertainment. There is even an auction, all of which is kindly donated by local businesses and kind hearted residents and friends of the village. The music, lighting, scenery and special effects add to the cast's unbelievably funny performances.



Most of the cast and back stage crew have been part of this crazy and wonderful adventure from the very beginning and others have joined us along the way. It is thanks to their hard work, dedication, generosity and support that over the 8 years of organising these shows we have raised over £22,000 for the school!

We would like to add a personal note that without them all (and you all know who you are!!!) none of these crazy but fun loving shows would have ever been possible. You all really are an amazing team of dedicated and highly talented friends.

We would also like to take this opportunity to thank each and every one of you who gave your support, came and watched the shows, kind words and most importantly cash for our school. Having a team of parents, staff, governors and friends of the school in this production has really brought people together and so many talents have been recognised that would have otherwise gone unnoticed!

Isabelle will be competing at level 7 nationally in Milton Keynes in May 2019 and we are so excited to watch her. The team is amazing and would highly recommend them.


